Message from the CEO: Hope is Unstoppable

At MercyFirst, we are always hopeful about what a new day and a new season brings – for our kids and for the agency. It is why in the midst of the recession we changed our tag line to reflect what we have always believed at MercyFirst - hope is unstoppable!

This is especially true given how difficult this last winter has been and especially how difficult the economy has been on all of us over the last few years. While deep in the throes of the recession, every family we work with has been under more financial pressure than usual. Every public agency we contract with to provide services for had to find ways to reduce expenses and do whatever it could do to get through these tough times. Private fundraising by MercyFirst stayed flat in the early years of the recession but then dropped off as many individuals and companies dug in for the long haul. Our staff have also been stretched farther than they should as MercyFirst has not been able to give raises of any kind over the past few years as government cut back on funding.

Now, as the first signs of spring can be seen with the snow melting and green buds starting to form on trees and bushes, we continue to remain hopeful. Recently, we were asked by ACS to pilot an evidence-based model called Partnering for Success to see how effective this approach can be in improving the well-being of children in family foster care. Over the last few months, we opened two new mother-baby residences in Queens with each caring for 3 teen moms and their child. In March, we were awarded a contract by ACS to open a new program called the Youth Reception Center at a facility in Brooklyn we are now renovating. This program will work with foster teens who have not succeeded so far in the difficult life and circumstances they have been handed. Like all our programs, this one will provide a full range of services to engage and stabilize these youth and to see how we can work together to give them a new start in life.

While we are all familiar with the phrase "Hope Springs Eternal", at MercyFirst we have our own take on this approach to life and to life's challenges that our children and families are faced with!

Meet Shawn

Shawn is a 19 year old resident in one of MercyFirst's Long Island Group Homes. He is a participant in MercyFirst's *Bridges to the Future* program, a youth development program which helps prepare youth for when they leave foster care. The program provides youth with skills and training that they need to secure jobs, scholarship assistance and financial help to live independently. Over the summer Shawn had an opportunity to internship at Family Residences and Essential Enterprises, Inc. (FREE) and worked in the Maintenance Department. His site supervisor said that Shawn was a fast learner, hard worker, and great asset to the department. The internship provided Shawn with valuable experience in landscaping, tree and plant maintenance as well as other areas of the department. These newly learned skills will help Shawn as he pursues a career in the future.

Because of his successful participation in the internship program, Shawn was honored in October at FREE's Annual Gala. He was recognized for his successful participation in the Ziegest Foundation sponsored internship program and Youth Leadership workshops, which provided

support services for youth in Foster Care. At the Gala, Shawn spoke to the audience about his experiences. He told the audience, "I like everything about the work I did at the FREE agency, it was hard work but fun at the same time... It was a great internship. I got to learn new skills that will be good in my future... I know that I have to be responsible in making the right choices for myself, saving my money and planning for a great future to succeed and be a great role model for my brothers. My message to everyone who may share the same foster-care experience as me is "You can do anything if you put your mind to it!"

In January, Shawn graduated High School and is working full time at Pathmark and the Cheesecake Factory and is a Union member receiving benefits. The next step for Shawn is that he is looking to participate in the Youth Build program, which is a vocational training program, where he will build upon the skills learned at his internship program and continue to learn more about construction. Upon completion of the program, he will be placed with the department of Labor in a Construction Union program.



The Frank J. Antun Foundation Supports Bridges to the Future

A recent grant from the Frank J. Antun Foundation allowed for MercyFirst's *Bridges to the Future program* to offer new paid internship experiences at Family Residences and Essential Enterprises, Inc. (FREE) on Long Island. The program is split into two five-week sessions where youth can work up to 14 hours per week at the job site. In the past, *Bridges to the Future* only had funding to support Summer Internship experiences for youth in MercyFirst's Residential programs, but with the generous support from the Frank J. Antun Foundation, new career exploration services for youth are now available.

The first cycle started in January 2015, with two youth working as Clerical Assistants and two working as Property Mechanic Assistants. The daily activities of the youth in the Clerical positions range from data entry, filing, preparing reports, greeting visitors and other general office related tasks. The Mechanic assistants are responsible for building maintenance, landscaping, and painting.

The men and women participating in *Bridges to the Future* are exposed to a variety of careers while receiving coaching, training and emotional support. The internship experiences are extremely beneficial to the youth as they gain valuable work and life skills that will assist them as they enter adulthood and transition out of foster care. They enjoy their jobs and take great pride in working in professional atmospheres. In a midterm report, FREE staff commented on the youth's "positive attitude and willingness to assist wherever needed", and [She] has embraced this opportunity".





The five-week session concluded with a recognition ceremony for the youth. They got to speak about their internship at FREE and share about the program. One of the youth told the audience that, "This experience has opened my eyes and made me see I am a valuable person and have a lot to give back based on where I come from. This will not come easy but I am willing to put in hard work to overcome my downfalls." "I have learned to develop important professional life skills that will be beneficial in future jobs. I hope to pursue a career in Criminal Justice, and this internship has taught me basic skills that I will need to achieve my goal," said one of the young ladies about her experience working as a Clerical Assistant.
